At this writing we find ourselves one month from the cutoff date for the women's walk with only two ladies and four men signed up for the walks. When we get in this situation, we tend to sponsor anyone we can talk into going on the walk. So I'd like to remind you of the guidelines set forth in sponsorship training as to who we should and should not sponsor.

Purposeful Sponsoring

Church Leaders – both Lay and Clergy

Dependable Church members – when there is a need, they step up to do the work

Less Active members - to get them interested in doing more

Christians Looking for something more – give them a short course in grace

Christians who want to grow spiritually – again, give them a short course in grace

Christians from all parts of our community – cross ethnic and economic boundaries

Respected Laypersons and Clergy – their participation will validate Emmaus for others

Questionable Sponsoring

Non-Christians – Emmaus is not intended to be a means of conversion to Christianity

Persons in Emotional Crisis – Do not use Emmaus to fix a person's problems

Christians whose theology or practices are notably different Church Hoppers

Persons who are always looking for a spiritual high

Reminders

The team is very good at meeting the needs of pilgrims that we are aware of; please explain the walk format well enough to the pilgrim so they can communicate any needs that have to be met to make the walk great. Communicate those same needs to the registrar so the team is aware of them prior to the pilgrim's arrival.


If your pilgrim has medication that needs to be taken at a specific time each day help them fill out a 3x5 card ahead of time to give to the Pilgrim ALD Thursday night. This will save them time and frustration as they are trying to get from "My New Friend" to Chapel or to bed. Also, if they have a med that needs refrigeration, have them put it in a container with their name on it. There will be a refrigerator in the conference room for storing meds in. Show it to them when you arrive on Thursday night.

If your pilgrim uses expendable medical supplies (syringes, oxygen, etc) make sure they have enough to last the whole weekend. Running out on Saturday makes it hard for the pilgrim to enjoy the weekend.

If the team has an issue with a pilgrim that they cannot solve quickly, the team is going to call the sponsor for help.

Remember, when you sign the application you are agreeing to meet all the pilgrim's needs during the weekend.



I found myself singing one song that for most people today would be obscure. A man was sleeping at night in his cabin when suddenly his room filled with light and the Savior appeared. The Lord told the man he had work for him to do, and showed him a large rock in front of his cabin. The Lord explained that the man was to push against the rock with all his might. This the man did, day after day. For many years he toiled from sun up to sun down, his shoulders set squarely against the cold, massive surface of the unmoving rock, pushing with all his might.

Each night the man returned to his cabin sore, and worn out, feeling that his whole day had been spent in vain. Seeing that the man was showing signs of discouragement, the Adversary decided to enter the picture by placing thoughts into the man's weary mind: "You have been pushing against that rock for a long time, and it hasn't budged. Why kill yourself over this? You are never going to move it." Thus giving the man the impression that the task was impossible and that he was a failure, these thoughts discouraged and disheartened the man.

"Why kill myself over this?" he thought. "I'll just put in my time, giving just the minimum effort and that will be good enough." And that is what he planned to do until one day he decided to make it a matter of prayer and take his troubled thoughts to the Lord. "Lord," he said, "I have labored long and hard in your service, putting all my strength to do that which you have asked. Yet, after all this time, I have not even budged that rock by half a millimeter. What is wrong? Why am I failing?"

The Lord responded compassionately, "My child, when I asked you to serve me and you accepted, I told you that your task was to push against the rock with all your strength, which you have done. Never once did I mention to you that I expected you to move it. Your task was to push. And now you come to me, with your strength spent, thinking that you have failed. But, is that really so? Look at yourself. Your arms are strong and muscled, your back sinew and brown, your hands are callused from constant pressure, and your legs have become massive and hard. Through opposition you have grown much and your abilities now surpass that which you used to have. Yet you haven't moved the rock. But your calling was to be obedient and to push and to exercise your faith and trust in My wisdom. This you have done. I, my friend, will now move the rock."

At times, when we hear a word from God, we tend to use our own intellect to decipher what He wants, when actually what God wants is just simple obedience and faith in Him. By all means, exercise the faith that moves mountains, but know that it is still God who moves the mountains.

Over the summer months, I have seen a lot of people hurting due to the loss of a

loved one, financial problems, marriage problems, issues at work, feeling alone, or health issues. It just seems to be an ongoing thing with just about everyone around us. It doesn't even matter if you are rich or poor, famous or not, there are trials and tribulations everywhere.

I have faced my own trials this summer and in the months prior, and as I would lie in pain knowing how much I need to get done for this or for that, I asked, Why Lord? Something that we should never ask!! In a similar way, a broken life can be renewed when it is touched by God's love and grace. We need to remember that we are never too badly broken for God to reshape. He loves us in spite of our imperfections and past mistakes, and He desires to make us beautiful. We just have to allow the transformation.


