After the walk, talking to pilgrims and learning how the walk changed their lives – Blessed!



From Our Assistant Community Lay Director

It's Thursday night. There may be a feeling of apprehension or uncertainty. We ease into the weekend. Friday morning we begin our ascent. The trail is well laid out. The climb is fairly easy and not too steep. After a day of travel we arrive at Base Camp. We need to rest up because the journey that we are continuing on will become more difficult.

Saturday the trail becomes steeper and not as wide, the walking tends to go slower than the day before. If we were actually climbing a physical mountain we would find that the air is getting thinner. By Saturday night we reach the mountain top. This, of course, means that we are at a turning point.

Something has changed in our lives, we may not realize it until sometime down the road but some will realize it right away. Remember, this is in God's Time. As we look out from this vantage point we look up and see a bright sun, beautiful blue sky, off to the west we see a pristine lake, and as we look farther down the mountain we see the lush green valley. What grows on the mountain top? The time on the mountain top is short; if we do not begin our descent we will not last long because of lack of oxygen.

By Sunday we have made our way back down to base camp. We are tired and drained, not just physically but spiritually and emotionally as well. But this is a good tired. We are now heading back into the valley to grow. The walk is not going to have the same effect on everyone. Some may not truly realize what the walk has meant to them until further down the road.

Although the mountain top experience is not the main purpose of Emmaus it may be a pleasant by product. Emmaus is to help develop Christian Leadership. It is in this valley that not only do we grow our churches and family, but we also grow the Emmaus Community.

We just came off of two fantastic walks. Now is the time to start thinking and praying about filling the next walk. This is a process that cannot begin too early. May God continue to lead each one of us on our fourth day journey.

Fourth Day Reflections

John 13:31-35

(Given by Pastor Jim Hegedus at the conclusion of the Men's Walk)

Tonight we are all on the same page together. Tonight we are all in our Fourth Day together. This means that we have been empowered by the Spirit to serve a life of discipleship in our local churches, in our families, and in our communities.

What does this mean? First it means to go home and get some rest. Second, it means to thank God and thank your sponsor for this opportunity to be renewed. And third, its means that there is work to be done...

One of my favorite children's books is by Dr. Seuss, *The Cat in the Hat Comes Back*. It starts out this way:

This was no time for play.

This was no time for fun.

This was no time for games.

There was work to be done.

All the deep, deep, deep snow

All that snow had to go.

When our mother went down to the town for the day,

She said, "Somebody has to clean all this away. Somebody, Somebody has to, you see."

Then she picked out two somebodies: Sally and me.

The goal of Emmaus is not to recreate the Walk in the local church or to recruit people for the next weekend retreat. The goal is to return the spirit of agape, which is also the spirit of Emmaus, to the local church. As pilgrims return from Emmaus, we all need to ask ourselves: How can I help my congregation be intensely loving? How can I help my congregation think of ministry as an act of agape?


Jesus said, "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:34-35).

Returning to the congregation is above all a matter of returning with a greater awareness of and reliance on God's love.

In the excitement of the Walk to Emmaus, we sometimes forget that the purpose of the event is to develop Christian disciples who will renew local churches. How do pilgrims bring agape to their congregations? To be agents of renewal, they must make God's love tangible. Lawrence Martin compiled a list of **20 Ways to Renew the Church.** I want to share these with you as I close:

- 1. Ask your pastor how you can be in ministry.
- 2. Be the friendliest person at a church event.
- 3. Teach a Sunday school class.
- 4. Start a prayer group.
- 5. Sponsor a congregational leader for the next Walk to Emmaus.
- 6. Begin a Bible study group.
- 7. Help with the youth group; introduce them to Chrysalis.
- 8. Sponsor the pastor and his or her spouse on a Walk.
- Help the church secretary with the newsletter or other duties.
- 10. Write about the Walk to Emmaus for the church newsletter.
- 11. Visit the homebound for prayer and fellowship.
- 12. Visit people in the hospital.
- 13. Join the women's or men's group in the church. (If your church doesn't have a group, could you start one?)
- 14. Be a friendly usher at worship.
- 15. Volunteer to serve on the worship, mission, or evangelism committee or in another area of ministry that interests you.
- 16. Help with the church library.
- 17. Serve on the board of trustees; open the church building to the community.
- 18. Tithe.
- 19. Send agape to church members in crisis.
- 20. Start a program to feed the hungry or to shelter the homeless.

Remember: the real Fourth Day of the Walk to Emmaus involves the renewal of your church. There is work to be done!

I have had some questions about what it costs to put on a walk verses what we take in. So I thought I would share some numbers and thoughts. First the numbers:

Walks	
Income	\$ 2,996.00

Kitchen Supplies	\$ 709.01
Walk supplies	\$ 592.94
	\$ 5,344.02

As you can see the numbers show we took in more than we spent on direct costs for the walks. But, the numbers are not quit accurate.

Many people donated food for the walks. It is estimated the donations were over \$500 for the women's walk and I did not receive a number for the men's. You could say the donations would show up in both numbers but I doubt we would have seen more income if we had paid for the food. **Thank you for all the donations!**

One of the community members paid for the pictures (about \$100 total) and never asked for reimbursement. I don't know how many other expenses were paid by the person running to the store and never being reimbursed, but again, these were expenses that could have been and that likely would not have had a corresponding income. Again, thank you for the donations!

The community also had an unexpected expense this year. We had to replace all the team manuals this year, primarily because the manuals changed. But the replacement started because many of them were worn out or missing, which lead us to the discovery that our manuals were out of date. To add to the cost, with two walks in the fall we had to have two sets of manuals. Total cost of all new manuals - \$700.

Again, thank you for all the donations, be they food, supplies or money!

Matthew 20:20-28

Christians are identified by a variety of names in the Bible—such as believers, brothers, and saints—but one title we seldom call ourselves is, "servants of Christ." After His disciples wrangled about who was the greatest, Jesus turned their worldly thinking upside down with a call to become great in the kingdom by being a servant of ALL.

Welcome to our new members from walks W-58 and M-58. If I have a valid email address for you, then you received this newsletter as a PDF attachment to an email. Let me know if you would prefer it as a Word file, or not as an attachment, but as text in the body of an email. If I do not have your email address, then for the next year you will be getting a printed version of the newsletter. After the first year, it is \$5 per year to cover the cost of duplicating and postage.

As a member of the Emmaus community, you may access the on-line database for the community, IMS, or Internet Membership System. To access IMS you must have Internet access and use Internet Explorer or Firefox as your browser. The web site is jaec.inetmember.com

Your userid is your email address if IMS knows it. Otherwise, your userid is first name.last name. Note that there is a period between the first and last names.

Everyone's initial password is jaecjaec.

If you cannot sign in, send me an email, and I will reset your userid and password.

In IMS you will be able to access information about the community, your walk, newsletters, update your contact information, and say whether or not it should be visible to other members of the community. You will be able to volunteer for positions in the auxiliary and/or the conference room team and the prayer vigil for upcoming walks.

Once you are signed in, there is a blue bar near the top of the screen with the words: <u>Home IMS Common You Community Sign Out</u>. Putting the mouse on one of these words, except <u>Home</u> and <u>Sign Out</u>, opens a drop-down list. Clicking on an item in the list opens a web page or an additional navigation bar. The second item in the list under <u>You</u> takes you to a page where you can change your userid and/or password. The first time you sign in, you will be asked to change your password to something other than the default. I urge you to try IMS to see what it can do for you. Email me if you have problems or questions.

I knew not why each choice was made.


Undeserving of God's grace,
